## Key Terms and Acronyms in Special Education Law

FAPE	<ul> <li>Free Appropriate Public Education</li> <li>An educational right of children with disabilities in the United States that is guaranteed by the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).</li> </ul>
IDEA	<ul> <li>The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act</li> <li>Provides educational protections for students who meet criteria necessary for classification in one of the thirteen categories specified under the act.</li> </ul>
IEP	<ul> <li>Individualized Education Program</li> <li>A written statement detailing the unique educational needs and services provided to a student with a qualifying disability under IDEA.</li> </ul>
Section 504	<ul> <li>Anti-discrimination act</li> <li>Protects students from discrimination based on their disability. Encompasses a broader range of disabilities than IDEA.</li> </ul>

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504 Plan	<ul> <li>Document generated from Anti-discrimination act provisions</li> <li>Documents strategies and resources afforded to a student with a disability affecting a major life activity in order to prevent discrimination in school.</li> </ul>
CSE	<ul> <li>Committee on Special Education (age 5-12)</li> <li>A multidisciplinary team, that includes parents and students, responsible for students with disabilities from ages 5-21. The CSE is authorized to identify students in need of services by determining eligibility and develop an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) to meet each student's individual needs.</li> </ul>
CPSE	Committee on Preschool Special Education (age 3-5) • Similar to CSE, for students ages 3-5.
LRE	<ul> <li>Least Restrictive Environment</li> <li>Under the IDEA students must be educated in a classroom setting as close to a general education setting as possible where than can still make academic gains.</li> </ul>
MDR	<ul> <li>Manifestation Determination Review</li> <li>A meeting to determine whether or not a student's misconduct is a result of their disability or school's failure to implement their IEP when that student is facing a suspension that will exceed 5 days or has been removed from the classroom setting for 10 days (or the equivalent of 10 days).</li> </ul>

BIP	<ul> <li>Behavior Intervention Plan</li> <li>A written plan that targets a student's undesirable behavior(s) with interventions that are clearly measurable, including prevention strategies and replacement behaviors.</li> </ul>
FBA	<ul> <li>Functional Behavior Assessment</li> <li>A process which examines a student's disruptive behaviors, looks for the reasons behind the behaviors and offers interventions that teach new behaviors to replace the undesired ones.</li> </ul>
AT	<ul> <li>Assistive Technology</li> <li>Any device, equipment or software that helps a student with a disability increase, maintain or improve their functional capabilities (excludes medical devices).</li> </ul>
El	<ul> <li>Early Intervention (age 0-3)</li> <li>A system of services that helps babies and toddlers with developmental delays or disabilities from birth to their third birthdays.</li> </ul>
IFSP	<ul> <li>Individualized Family Service Plan</li> <li>A written treatment plan that maps out the early intervention services a child (age birth to his/her third birthday) will receive, as well as how and when these services will be administered. It details a child's current levels of functioning, specific needs and goals for treatment (referred to as outcomes).</li> </ul>

RCT	<ul> <li>Regents Competency Test</li> <li>Exit exams given to identified special education students with Individualized Education Programs or a 504 plan seeking a high school diploma who cannot pass the standard Regents exams.</li> </ul>
15:1:1	A type of classroom structure common on an IEP or 504 plan consisting of 15 students, 1 teacher, and 1 aid.
12:1:1	A type of classroom structure common on an IEP or 504 plan consisting of 12 students, 1 teacher, and 1 aid.
6:1:1	A type of classroom structure common on an IEP or 504 plan consisting of 6 students, 1 teacher, and 1 aid.

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
